We have celebrated the arrival of Jesus at a simple stable in a small town just over 2,000 years ago. We have covered the story of Jesus at 12 years old answering questions from teachers that normally answer questions of those who were entering into adulthood. I also shared the story recently of the first miracle Jesus performed at

a wedding of a peasant couple, in an even smaller town than where he was born.

Why do I share this with you? This is the time of year when the Lectionary will help guide us through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus and what these stories mean to us today. Coming up this month I am planning on stepping away from that on a couple of Sundays. One Sunday will be giving an update on how things have changed for me in the past 12 months. Another Sunday will be spent talking about something I share very often in my messages during Worship services. Something that really isn't hard to guess.

Looking ahead, we are getting very close to the beginning of the Lenten season. On March 2nd I will again this year provide an opportunity for anyone who wants to come to the north entrance at Evan and self-impose ashes on their forehead to commemorate Ash Wednesday. As I write this, no decision has been made regarding the Wednesday evening services that have been previously held for County West churches.

Starting Monday March 7th, I will be leading a Lenten Bible study. It is the same study I started in 2020 before we had to stop when the pandemic was first declared. It is a wonderful Max Lucado study that had a good response previously. I will be offering two opportunities for this study, each Monday afternoon from 1:30-2:30 pm or Monday evenings from 6:30-7:30. More information will be provided inside the newsletter.

If this isn't enough, confirmation classes are continuing for seven teens. The classes take place two Sunday afternoons each month and will lead to a confirmation service in May. I will share more information regarding that service in the coming months, but I ask that everyone please pray for the students who are in the class as they work towards completion.

Inside this issue:

A lot of things happening in the coming months that have me excited. I am so glad that this month we will reach one full year since we resumed in-person services, but we are closing in on two years of online services as well. We've had a lot of things that have happened since I first started serving this Parish and hopefully we will have more to share with everyone in the coming months. As always, I give thanks to God for sending me to serve this Parish and I feel beyond Blessed every day I am here!





Faith's role in love - In It's Okay Not to Be Okay, Christian author Sheila Walsh looks at the all-

encompassing love that Jesus expects of his followers. He commands us to "love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself" (Luke 10:27, ESV).

But we can't love that way without faith, Walsh writes. "I'm not living by faith if I have an answer to everything. If I understand everything God does or doesn't do, then all I need to love him with is my mind. We're called to love him with more." That "more," she explains, involves these paradoxes: "We love with all our heart, even when it's

broken. We love with our soul, even when our humanity wrestles against our situation. We love with our strength, even when it's almost gone. We love with our mind, even when we don't understand."

Even if God's purposes and plans don't make sense here on earth, we can heed this advice from the great preacher Charles Spurgeon: "When we cannot trace [God's] hand, we must trust his heart."



<u>Hope-filled hearts</u> - When Bowen Hammitt was born with essentially half a heart, the odds were stacked against him. But after three surgeries and numerous setbacks, Bowen is now an active 11-year-old who raises awareness about congenital heart disease. He's also a budding Christian musician, following in the footsteps of his dad, Matt (formerly with Sanctus Real). The Hammitts use Bowen's story to offer hope amid adversity — "a message the world really needs right now." The documentary *Bowen's Heart* features this tagline: "Is it worth giving your heart to something that can break it?" Absolutely, say his loved ones, who describe Bowen and his life as incredible blessings from God.

For Matt Hammitt, Proverbs 13:12 is now a favorite Bible verse. "Hope deferred makes the heart sick," it reads, "but a longing fulfilled is a tree of life" (NIV).

Beyond candy hearts and roses- The first half of February seems dominated by pink and red, cards and candy. But people not in a loving romantic relationship can sometimes feel left out of the festivities. Of course, all people need love — and certainly love is not limited to the romantic kind. Author Leo Buscaglia, who became known as "Dr. Love" for writing about the topic, said, "Too often we underestimate the power of a touch, a smile, a kind word, a listening ear, an honest compliment or the smallest act of caring, all of which have the potential to turn a life around."



Jesus taught that loving one another is second only in importance to loving God (Matthew 22:37-40), and that when we love one another, God lives in us (1 John 4:12). There are so many ways to do that — beyond candy hearts and roses! But Valentine's Day is as good a reminder as any.

But a really fine teacher comes into his life but rarely."



Fine teachers are indeed worth cherishing, whether they hold classes in churches or public schools, on Sundays or on weekdays. Let us honor and appreciate all teachers, all year long. Thank you for preparing lessons with care, for going above and beyond to meet each student's needs, and for sparking curiosity about God and everything he created. You're a blessing!



The gift of animals—When God made the animals and gave them to the first human being in the Garden of Eden, though they weren't *precisely* the companion Adam needed, not all was lost. According to Genesis 2, God gave Adam the privilege of naming them all, and when you name something or someone, you bond with that being in a special way. Ever since creation, humans and animals have been connected — often for good purposes, though sometimes not; as the saying goes, "It's complicated."

But on the positive side, Trisha McCagh, a renowned animal communicator, writes: "Animals are the bridge between us and the beauty of all that is natural. They show us what's missing in our lives, and how to love ourselves more completely and unconditionally. They connect us back to who we are and to the purpose of why we're here."
