Hope Begins Here — These three words are the motto for Cunningham Children's Home in Urbana. For 130 years they have been providing home to many children and families. They currently provide caring support for almost 1,000 youths and families, according to their website.

So why am I sharing this information? September 2025 will be 47 years that I have been involved in various ways with Cunningham. It started when the (then new) radio station at Parkland College received a letter asking if anyone at the station would be able to DJ a dance for the youth living there. At that time I was a sophomore who was doing DJ work on the side along with being involved at the radio station. That afternoon dance led to two other dances I was happy to be a part of in 1979.

After my graduation from Parkland College, I worked in radio for more than a decade at various central Illinois stations, before moving on to my next career stop as a truck driver. But over the years I spent around 20 years off and on as a play-by-play announcer for sports, mainly at a station in Farmer City, IL. During that time, when I was financially able, I would give money through my home church to help the kids at Cunningham.

When I arrived here on July 1, 2019, I was blessed to find out how much involvement this parish has had with Cunningham. From numerous quits to other supplies and monetary gifts that have been donated, the children have been helped wonderfully! And that support continues today. I have made several trips to deliver gifts cards and other items to Cunningham that have been donated here.

There have been a few times while I've been here when Cunningham has provided a speaker when I have been on vacation. They share a message of hope each time they are here and I am happy to reach out to them when needed.

In late 2023 I made the decision to become a member of the Cedar's Society at Cunningham. This group is made up of people who are providing estate money to the organization to continue their mission

of providing hope for youth and families. I work with Tim Manard, the Development Officer there, and have developed a good relationship with him. On April 3rd, I was asked to be a speaker at their annual Cedar's Society event just prior to the annual Festival of Quilts. Some of what I shared earlier in this article I shared to over 70 in attendance that evening.

Tim will be 'returning the favor' and speaking at the May 4th services at Evan and Grand Prairie while I am on vacation. He recently announced that he will be retiring from his role at Cunningham on June 30th, so this will probably be his last time to speak here. I know that he works with UWF groups throughout our conference, it would be nice to have a great turnout to wish him well as he goes to retirement.

Hope Begins Here. I have been blessed to be involved with Cunningham Children's Home for so many years and hope to be able to continue for years to come. I pray that they are able to begin the process of hope for many more in the years to come, along with those they are currently helping.



Reflecting on resurrection: In *Rest Your Dreams on a Little Twig*, poet Joyce Rupp finds in spring flowers the proclamation of the gospel: "we who have died / are alive today." In another poem in the same volume, she writes: "A green shoot grows / out of an old tree stump, / announcing to the world / that power lies within death."

As you move about outdoors these springtime days in the northern hemisphere, where do you see nature testifying to resurrection? Where is evidence that what seemed dead — bare branches, dry grass, inactive seeds — was not in fact the final word? What encourages you to believe in renewal, second chances, life that blossoms from death? In what ways are you, who had died, alive today? Part of your life that felt like an old stump might be sprouting green shoots after all!





Loving my "enemies": In polarized times, when people view huge concepts such as justice, government policy and care for neighbors differently, how do we follow Jesus' command to love our enemies? I prefer the word *opponents*, but our Lord's instructions still stand.

In the Bible, "love" doesn't mean liking someone; it means caring for them, treating them kindly. I find *The Message* paraphrase of Luke 6:27-36 helpful: "Let them bring out the best in you, not the worst," Jesus says about one's enemies. So, when I contact government leaders to express my opinions, I address them with respect, whether I agree with them or not. When I encounter a neighbor whose views oppose mine, I ask myself what I would want them to do for me, whether help with an errand or be friendly. Then, as The Message puts it, I "grab the initiative and do it for *them*."

And this, which might be the hardest: Amid tough times, Jesus says, "Respond with the supple moves of prayer." It's human nature to pray that God change our enemies' or opponents' minds. But it's more Christlike to pray for their health, their families and whatever *God* desires for them, not what *I* want. Can I do this? With God's help, yes.
